Extended essay - Reflections on planning and progress form

Candidate: This form is to be completed by the candidate during the course and completion of their EE. So far, I have undertaken preliminary research on my intended focus area - the effect of imperialist rule on legal systems in colonial states - and have thought about possible titles. Despite the research I have undertaken on the internet, I have found it difficult to narrow my focus towards a specific topic. A key challenge is the lack in any key events, which unfortunately means I have to analyse the effect of Imperialist rule on an abstract concepts, such as the 'rule of law.' In a research paper I have read, the author had to reduce the effect to a 'freedom index' - which I would not find ideal subject matter for my EE. Thus, I have considered shifting my focus to the link between colonialism and post-colonial states like my own, Malaysia.

Final reflection - Viva voce

Candidate comments:

Writing an Extended Essay has been difficult, but I am glad to have been involved with this process. Most difficult, I think, was the initial research in finding a topic, because getting involved with dense historical subject matter to craft an EE title was challenging when I knew very little about any topic. Despite this, I was able to read around a very broad subject colonialism – in order to fashion a title that was related to my interests, ethnic conflict. After finding a title, the work got progressively easier. However, a key challenge I faced was finding primary sources, as my field has not been deeply studied. I had to search the bibliographies of secondary sources in order to find the relevant primary ones to inform my research. While this was a key methodological flaw with my research, I still felt my work was relatively accurate and reliable. Even if it wasn't, I felt that grappling for primary sources has been rewarding, because I have gained valuable experience into research, a skill which I hope will be useful in the future.
